# WHAT FAMILIES TELL US ABOUT EARLY LEARNING AND CARE

In 2023, Pulse was charged with developing a comprehensive early learning and care plan for seven counties in southwest Michigan – Berrien, Branch, Cass, Calhoun, Kalamazoo, St. Joseph and Van Buren.

Pulse partnered with the RAPID Survey Project at Stanford University to support our gathering of family voices so that early learning and care professionals, policymakers, funders, economic and workforce developers, intermediaries and business leaders can make recommendations reflective of what families say they need.

As Pulse works to build understanding about what the people who teach and care for young children do, we are also shifting our language from 'child care' to 'early learning and care.' You'll see that reflected in this community profile, where we share how families use early learning and care, what their ideal care arrangement would look like, and their experiences applying for and using the state child care subsidy from the Child Development and Care Program.



## The state child care subsidy is helpful, but some parents experience barriers



of families surveyed did not apply for a subsidy because they were unsure if they were eligible. This was the top reason.

More Black and Latinx families applied for a subsidy than did white families.

60%

Yet, just over 60% of Black and Latinx families received a subsidy,

96%

compared to 96% of white families.

Black, Latinx and other non-white parents had much more difficulty finding a provider to accept the subsidy, than did white parents.



Families in Cass and Berrien counties (33%) had more difficulty finding a provider to accept their subsidy. St. Joseph County families (15%) found it the least difficult.

RAPID partners with cities, counties, and states to gather essential and ongoing information and caregiver voices, provide timely and relevant data to inform local policies and programs, and develop the capacity of local organizations to employ rapid-cycle survey methods and enhance the impact of their work on behalf of child, families and the child care workforce.
